

'Atoms for Peace' Exhibit Planned for Orange Show

Residents of Southern California will soon have the opportunity to see one of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission's newest traveling exhibits. The exhibit, entitled "Atoms for Peace," will be presented at the 42nd National Orange Show in San Bernardino March 14-24. It will be in the huge tent housing the automotive show.

The "Atoms for Peace" exhibit has been prepared by the commission as one of its programs to bring the latest developments in nuclear energy to the attention and understanding of the general public.

The main part of the exhibit, which occupies some 7,000 feet of presentation space, consists of more than 80 panel displays, several of which are animated. In addition, the exhibit features several displays showing outstanding developments in nuclear-energy technology:

POWER PLANT MODEL

A 16-foot model of a nuclear power plant for the production of electricity, a "balloon suit" worn by personnel working in areas of radioactive contamination, and a pair of mechanical "hands" which enable researchers to manipulate radio-active materials easily from the outside of heavily shielded cells.

The exhibit is one of several operated for the Atomic Energy Commission by the American Museum of Atomic Energy, Oak Ridge, Tennessee.

There will be no admission charge for the exhibit, which is being presented. The exhibit will be open almost continuous-
